- City Charter
 - City Administrator Hunt has asked the Board to indicate if they are interested in budgeting for a City Charter in 2019; Charter costs are estimated at \$40,000-\$60,000 for 2019 and an additional \$30,000-\$50,000 for the following year bringing the all-inclusive cost to an estimated \$110,000; legal costs could increase as issues are discussed; City Attorney Geary provided an example of how costs could change during the course of the Charter creation
 - Charter cities have the advantage of flexibility in the way departments are set up and provide opportunities that aren't given to 4th class cities
 - City Administrator Hunt noted that staff began working on the budget about 5 weeks ago and asked for the Board's level of interest in budgeting funds for the process in 2019; City Administrator Hunt would prefer to have a better understanding of things the Board would like to change through Charter adoption; Charters are typically put in place to address cities who have unique issues once they have reached a certain size; City Administrator Hunt feels that a Charter is

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right for Grain Valley but isn't sure if the City is ready at this time; Alderman West felt it was premature for Grain Valley at this point to move towards a Charter; Alderman Coleman would like a workshop to learn more about the details of a Charter before making a decision

- Aldermen Headley asked if it was possible to earmark money over time to allow a Charter to be paid for in the future; this is possible
- City Administrator Hunt recognized the desire for a workshop to be held; Mayor Todd wanted the Board to understand the expense when making a decision regarding holding a workshop; Alderman Coleman reiterated he would like to know more before making a decision; Alderman Totton and Alderman Headley concurred with Alderman Coleman; a workshop will be scheduled

ITEM X: NEW BUSINESS

- Liquor License Outer Belt Entertainment, LLC
 - City Clerk Osenbaugh presented a Liquor License Application for Outer Belt Entertainment, LLC; paperwork has been received and Chief Beale has reviewed the application with approval; Occupational License is pending receipt of proof of insurance which will be obtained when the sale is final; Representatives Aaron Beatty and Matt Brokaw were present for questions
 - Alderman Totton asked for the location of the proposed license; Outer Belt Entertainment, LLC will be taking over Whiskey Tango should the sale be finalized
 - Alderman Headley asked for information on the implications for a 3AM license to the Police Department; Chief Beale shared that most calls to Whiskey Tango are between 1AM and AM; these calls tend to be the types of calls that take more time and resources
 - Alderman Totton asked if a car will be available should an intoxicated individual need a ride home; representatives noted a car would be available
 - City Administrator Hunt shared that the reason this license is coming before the Board is for the Board to make a decision in granting the license; liquor licenses are not transferable in this instance
 - Alderman Coleman asked what happens if they don't get a 3AM license; representatives shared that the operation will not be profitable to the point that makes sense for the sale without the 3AM license; representatives noted their current operations out of Kansas City have a 3AM license
 - Alderman Coleman asked what operating practices are in place to reduce issues; representatives shared that they would have additional security and off-duty officers; representatives plan to work with Chief Beale; identified that the biggest

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- issue is people coming from other establishments and safety is their biggest concern
 - Alderman Stratton asked for a definition of “on/off premises” ; City Clerk Osenbaugh read the definition for the requested license
 - Alderman Headley asked for more information regarding the current establishments owned; representatives shared that the track record for security and safety is great; owners have a great relationship with KCPD; stated they would rather be proactive and prepared; Alderman Headley asked how many incidents are seen a night at their current establishments; Mr. Brokaw noted that there aren’t incidents occurring and gave an example of zero incidents this past Sunday night when sales were large; Representatives stated they had been operating for approximately 4 years with no liquor infractions
 - Alderman West asked for clarification on how long the owners had been in business and where they are currently operating; been in business for four years and are working on purchasing Whiskey Tango; Alderman Stratton shared concerns with the call volume and serious nature of calls coming from Whiskey Tango; representatives shared they plan to be on-site five days a week
 - Alderman Headley shared concerns that city resources are taken up by the current establishment and other areas of town are feeling the impact of that; representatives shared they would prefer to allocate more dollars to security than what is currently occurring to help with using less City resources
 - Alderman Bamman asked the representatives what they would see happening if the initial license was granted without a Class M component for an interim period of 6 months at which time the 3AM was reconsidered; Outer Belt Entertainment would not purchase the business as revenues would suffer
 - Alderman Bamman reminded all that the license has to be read in two separate meetings and suggested the discussion be tabled for additional time; representatives were agreeable; Alderman Coleman preferred to table
 - Representatives were asked for the names of their current bars; establishments are Off Key Karoke and Throwback KC but they plan to operate a “tamer” version of those locations in Grain Valley; Alderman Headley asked for the future plans for the bar; plan to leave Whiskey Tango as a Country Bar with more concerts; would shut down briefly to coordinate hiring of staff, training, clean up inside and outside; plan to potentially reface the building, take out the carpets, reconstruct the bars and have allocated several thousands of dollars to bring a facelift

ITEM XI: PRESENTATIONS

- Concrete Replacement Program
 - Community Development Director Arroyo presented information on the concrete replacement program plans for the upcoming year; roads with the lowest index rating are considered first and work is based on the amount of dollars available per year; consideration is given to grouping roads by neighborhood if possible to save costs; plans are made for a period of five years; a lot more repair work is done by City staff than in years past which saves money
 - Processes are in place to update maps and road conditions but it is a lengthy process and is time consuming; Alderman Bamman asked how often indexes are updated; last update occurred in 2014; hiring for the Engineer Inspector position will help with updating the plans
 - Alderman Bamman asked if changes in traffic patterns caused concerns for prematurely wearing out roads; Greystone was provided as an example-recent development has started but streets actually wear our faster when they aren't being utilized which led to wear and tear faster than expected
 - Alderman Bamman asked about aggregate; KC MCIB is a grade index and the experience using it has been better

-Mayor Pro Tem Bamman Opened the Public Hearing for the zoning change of certain land from R-1 Single Family to C-3 highway Commercial at 8:09p.m.-

- Property in discussion is located off of Eagles Parkway; zoning request has been through Planning & Zoning; land is approximately 4.1 acres and includes 8 parcels; 3 parcels are currently being used for CW Saloon, 2 parcels are for single family and 3 parcels are undeveloped
- Mr. Risinger would like to develop the area into convince storage; current zoning does not

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allow for that; the bar on the property is considered a legal non-confirming use; Zoning of C3 an M1 are the only zoning districts in which this type of development would be allowed; light industrial zoning would not be approved but a C3 would allow for a commercial zoned district and is the future use plan for the area

- Zone change is the first step in the process and then a conditional use permit would need to be requested; the discussion tonight focusses strictly on the zoning of the property being changed to C3
- Planning and Zoning Commission reviewed the request in July; property owners were in attendance and those owners are also here this evening; apprehension from owners did not seem to be about the commercial zoning change but about the mini storage business plan; Planning and Zoning Commission recommended approval of the change with one member voting against the change; Planning and Zoning commission asked Mr. Risinger to contact nearby property owners stating his intent and that letter has been provide to the Board of Aldermen for this meeting; Mr. Risinger’s plan would be a three phase approach eventually including the removal of CW Saloon, however, this evening is strictly a discussion about the zoning change; Mr. Risinger and his engineer were present to answer questions

Mayor Pro Tem Bamman opened the floor to citizens for comment:

- Lois Young, 126 SW Eagles Parkway, has met with Mr. Risinger with concerns about lighting and fencing; has lived in the area a long time and would like to feel comfortable regarding the safety of the area; Ms. Lois asked for number of mini storage business in town; 3 are currently in town; Chief Beale noted that in general, the mini storage areas are fairly safe
- Alderman Headley asked Mr. Murphy to share information about the conditional use permit; Mr. Murphy state that there were 8 total parcels and 2 were not in the plans to be part of the mini storage area; each parcel is about the size of the lots the south of eagles parkway; CW’s Salon will still not be an allowed use under C3 so the conditional use permit will still be applicable; tonight’s hearing is to decide the zoning change and if it is approved, Mr. Risinger would need to apply for a conditional use permit requiring certain compliance such as fencing, lighting, etc. to protect the area neighborhoods; limits could be put in place on how late clients can enter the property
- Ms. Lois asked what would go on the two lots where homes are now there; Mr. Risinger stated that he likely would put the lots for sale and let market dictate the best fit, expecting it would be consistent with what business were in the area currently;
- Ms. Lois asked if any responsibility changed for sidewalks; developers must do road improvement but only to the extent of the property they have purchased;

- The Board of Aldermen of the City of Grain Valley, Missouri, met in a Workshop on August 13, 2018 at 9:20 p.m. in the Council Chambers located at Grain Valley City Hall

ITEM III: DISCUSSION

- 2019 Tax Levy
 - City Administrator Hunt explained that the levy sets the tax rate for residents; a public hearing must occur before the levy is sent to the County; levy has to be provided to the County by October 1st ; City Administrator Hunt explained that with growth comes the need to issue debt and the purpose of tonight is to review the debt, revenues and financial strategy of the City
 - Types of Debt were reviewed; General Obligation Bonds are typically repaid by taxation or project revenues; Certificates of Participation (COP) are only currently used by the Parks Department-these allow for the sale of shares of lease revenue from an agreement; Neighborhood Improvement Districts (NID) are a financial source for a geographically defined area in which public improvements are financed via bonds and are paid for by assessments on the properties within the NID; Tax Increment Financing (TIF) Bonds are bonds issued to spur economic growth by assisting in the financing of projects-paid back through capture of new taxes; Revenue Bonds are issued to finance income producing projects and are paid for by user fees and must have a specified revenue source
 - Outstanding Grain Valley Debt was reviewed; retired debt included Series GO 2008A which was refinanced earlier this year; 2012 and 2015 NID Notes were retired and are now 2016 NID Bonds which are paid by special assessments; 2012 IDA Bonds are the TIF Bonds and are backed by general fund obligation but is eligible for refunding soon-at this time they will be refinanced as revenue bonds and completely supported by the developer-City will still collect the money and pass it on for payment; 2013 WTR/SWR refunding has a balance of \$845,000 and will mature in 2020; 2013 GO refunding Series 2005 are Bonds issued for water, transportation and storm water improvements and this will be paid off next year; Refunding 2008A-Series 2018 is the refinancing of the bonds and will be paid off

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in 2028; 2011 GO Capital Appreciation Bond has been in deferment-bonds were issued to do the I70 Interchange project and City has been making interest only payments until 2020 when the full payments kicks in; total debt is \$16,624,676 and General Obligation Debit is \$12,739,676 which does not include IDA and NID Bonds

- Revenue Streams servicing debt were reviewed; Sales Tax, Property Tax, Special Assessments and User Fees are revenue streams
- Grain Valley Sales Tax breakdown: 1% General Fund, ½% Parks, ½% Transportation, ½% Capital Improvement; Alderman Bamman asked about Public Safety Sales Tax-this would be ¼% or ½% depending on revenue generation compared to the need; Alderman Coleman asked for information on Transportation percentage-streets, curbs and portion of sidewalks come from this revenue; Alderman Coleman asked if the increase in the state gasoline tax passes would Grain Valley receive some of the funds; Mayor Todd noted that the City is estimated to get \$200,000
- City Administrator Hunt reviewed the Current Grain Valley Levy; General is \$0.5554, Park is \$0.1226, Public Health is \$0.0489, Debt Service is \$1.0025 bringing the total levy to \$1.7294; vast majority goes towards Debt Service; each penny in the levy represents \$20,440
- Assessed valuation has increased by 5.4%; 2017 Assessed Valuation was \$193,930,570 and in 2018 it is \$204,403,777; some areas can be increased but debt service has to be dropped based on state maximums allowed; this means the levy can be rolled back this year; staff presented three options to drop the debt levy; City is in a good position to issue a no-tax due bond in the future for a municipal complex; Alderman Headley asked if the presentation assumed that the current complex be sold-City Administrator Hunt noted he is being conservative and is not counting any sale of the facility towards the financial ability to manage a new complex
- Alderman Bamman asked which calculation was closest to staying revenue neutral; top option is closest but still offers a savings; if levy is dropped to 1.6344 that is a net savings of 5.5%
- Alderman Headley if new homes were considered for assessed valuation; commercial and residential have been forecasted to estimate assessed valuation; over 100 single family dwellings are being constructed this year which will increase valuation
- Alderman Bamman asked if revenue neutral was the path; City Administrator Hunt recommended making a true .10 cent decrease which will put the City at 5.4% net decrease of level which matches increase of assessed valuation; would be near the presented numbers for 1.6344 levy

AN ORDINANCE AMENDING CHAPTER 220: FIREWORKS – SECTION 220.030, SECTION 220.060 AND SECTION 220.090 OF THE CODE OF ORDINANCES FOR THE CITY OF GRAIN VALLEY, MISSOURI

WHEREAS, the Mayor and Board of Aldermen are committed to the public's enjoyment of regulated fireworks displays during the Independence Day season;

WHEREAS, it is beneficial to have set dates established for the annual sale and discharge of fireworks;

WHEREAS, the Board of Aldermen of the City of Grain Valley, Missouri have determined that it is in the best interest of the City to amend the fireworks regulations for the City.

NOW THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED by the Board of Aldermen of the City of Grain Valley, Missouri as follows:

SECTION 1: Sections 220.030, 220.060 and 220.090, of Chapter 220 are amended to read as follows:

SECTION: 220.030: PERIOD OF SALE LIMITED

The period during which sale of fireworks is lawful by licensed fireworks vendors shall extend from seven (7) days prior to July fourth (4th) and shall end at 11:00 P.M. on July fourth (4th) each year.

SECTION: 220.060: SIGNS REQUIRED

Four (4) signs, red in color and a minimum of two (2) feet by four (4) feet in size, with white lettering, bearing the words "No smoking allowed nor discharging fireworks within one hundred (100) feet of stand" shall be displayed. Six (6) temporary off-site signs, balloons, or animations located on commercial or industrial zoned property are permitted. Signs are limited to 4 feet x 8 feet in size except that signs along I-70 may be 8 feet x 50 feet. Four (4) additional on-site signs are permitted. One (1) American flag shall be displayed on the site that is used for the sales of fireworks. A minimum of four (4) signs bearing the lawful discharge dates shall be posted in each sale tent and all purchasers of fireworks shall be given a copy of the lawful discharge dates to take home at the time of purchase. Signs are permitted only during the period that the sale of fireworks is permitted and they must be removed by July fifth (5th). Sign permits are not required for the above signs.

SECTION 220.090: DISCHARGE LAWFUL - WHEN

A. The discharge, detonation or shooting of fireworks shall only be permitted between the hours of 9:00 A.M. and 11:00 P.M. on the first (1st) Saturday of July each year as well as the third (3rd) and fourth (4th) of July each year. In years which the third (3rd) or fourth (4th) of July falls on a Saturday, the second (2nd) of July will also be allowed.

B. The explosion of fireworks at any other times is unlawful, except by special permit of the Board of Aldermen.

Article I: Generally

Section 220.030 Period of Sale Limited. [Code 1985, §66.030; CC 1990 §7-68; Ord. No. 1033 §1, 6-27-1996]

The period during which sale of fireworks is lawful by licensed fireworks vendors shall extend from seven (7) days prior to July fourth (4th) and shall end at 11:00 P.M. on July ~~fifth~~ fourth (~~5th~~ 4th) each year.

Section 220.060 Signs Required. [Code 1985, §66.080; CC 1990 §7-72; Ord. No. 802 §7-72, 6-22-1992; Ord. No. 990 §3, 11-27-1995]

Four (4) signs, red in color and a minimum of two (2) feet by four (4) feet in size, with white lettering, bearing the words "No smoking allowed nor discharging fireworks within one hundred (100) feet of stand" shall be displayed. Six (6) temporary off-site signs, balloons, or animations located on commercial or industrial zoned property are permitted. Signs are limited to 4 feet x 8 feet in size except that signs along I-70 may be 8 feet x 50 feet. Four (4) additional on-site signs are permitted. One (1) American flag shall be displayed on the site that is used for the sales of fireworks. A minimum of four (4) signs bearing the lawful discharge dates shall be posted in each sale tent and all purchasers of fireworks shall be given a copy of the lawful discharge dates to take home at the time of purchase. Signs are permitted only during the period that the sale of fireworks is permitted, ~~except that and~~ they must be removed by July fifth (5th). Sign permits are not required for the above signs.

Section 220.090 Discharge Lawful — When. [Code 1985, §66.160; CC 1990 §7-75; Ord. No. 533, 6-23-1986; Ord. No. 990 §4, 11-27-1995; Ord. No. 1033 §4, 6-27-1996; Ord. No. 2299 §1, 6-10-2013]

A. The discharge, detonation or shooting of fireworks shall only be permitted between the hours ~~of 1:00 P.M. and 11:00 P.M. on the third (3rd) of July and between the hours~~ of 9:00 A.M. and 11:00 P.M. on the first (1st) Saturday of July each year as well as the third (3rd) and fourth (4th) ~~and fifth (5th)~~ of July each year. In years which the third (3rd) or fourth (4th) of July falls on a Saturday, the second (2nd) of July will also be allowed.

B. The explosion of fireworks at any other times is unlawful, except by special permit of the Board of Aldermen.

BACKGROUND	<p>This zoning change is the first step in allowing the development of a convenience (mini) storage facility on the majority of the land as well as two future pad sites where single-family homes currently exist. These properties are approximately 4.1+/- acres in size and include eight parcels. Three of the parcels are currently undeveloped. Three are used for Charley's Roadhouse and two are used as single-family dwellings. Mr. Risinger approached staff with a proposal to develop the area into convenience storage. Staff let Mr. Risinger know that the current zoning wouldn't allow for that use.</p>	

<p>SPECIAL NOTES</p>	<p>According to our zoning code, convenience storage is only allowed by conditional use permit and can only be approved for parcels with M-1 light industrial or C-3 highway commercial zoned districts. Staff told Mr. Risinger that a change to M-1 would not be supported but that the area he was looking at is shown as commercial in the future land use plan. This would be the first step in the process to develop the land for convenience storage. There was a public hearing held at the July Planning & Zoning Commission and there will now be a public hearing and ordinance at the Board of Aldermen level to establish zoning. If the zoning change is approved, Mr. Risinger can then apply for a conditional use permit which will require a public hearing at a P&Z meeting as well as a public hearing and ordinance at the BOA level. Conditions addressing, lighting, landscaping and building materials can be added at that time to minimize negative effects on surrounding property owners.</p>
<p>ANALYSIS</p>	<p>Staff has looked at this area as future commercial with its location near the intersection of Main Street and SW Eagles Parkway as well as being across from Old Towne Marketplace. Specific uses were not something that was outlined in the Comprehensive Plan. The long-term plan for the applicant is to establish the zoning as C-3 and then apply for a conditional use permit for convenience storage that will take place in three phases with the removal of Charley's Roadhouse coming in the third phase. The two parcels which currently have single-family homes on them are not planned to be included in the convenience storage but will be available for individual commercial development. The two lots are similar in size to the old Red Cross Pharmacy lot. Changing the zoning of the lots used for Charley's Roadhouse will not affect any of the non-conformance issues that currently exist because bars are not an allowable use in C-3 districts.</p>

My name is Chad Risinger. I am currently seeking to purchase and develop the property near you owned by Richard Laswell. On July 18th the Grain Valley Planning and Zoning Committee voted to approve the zoning change for the Laswell property. 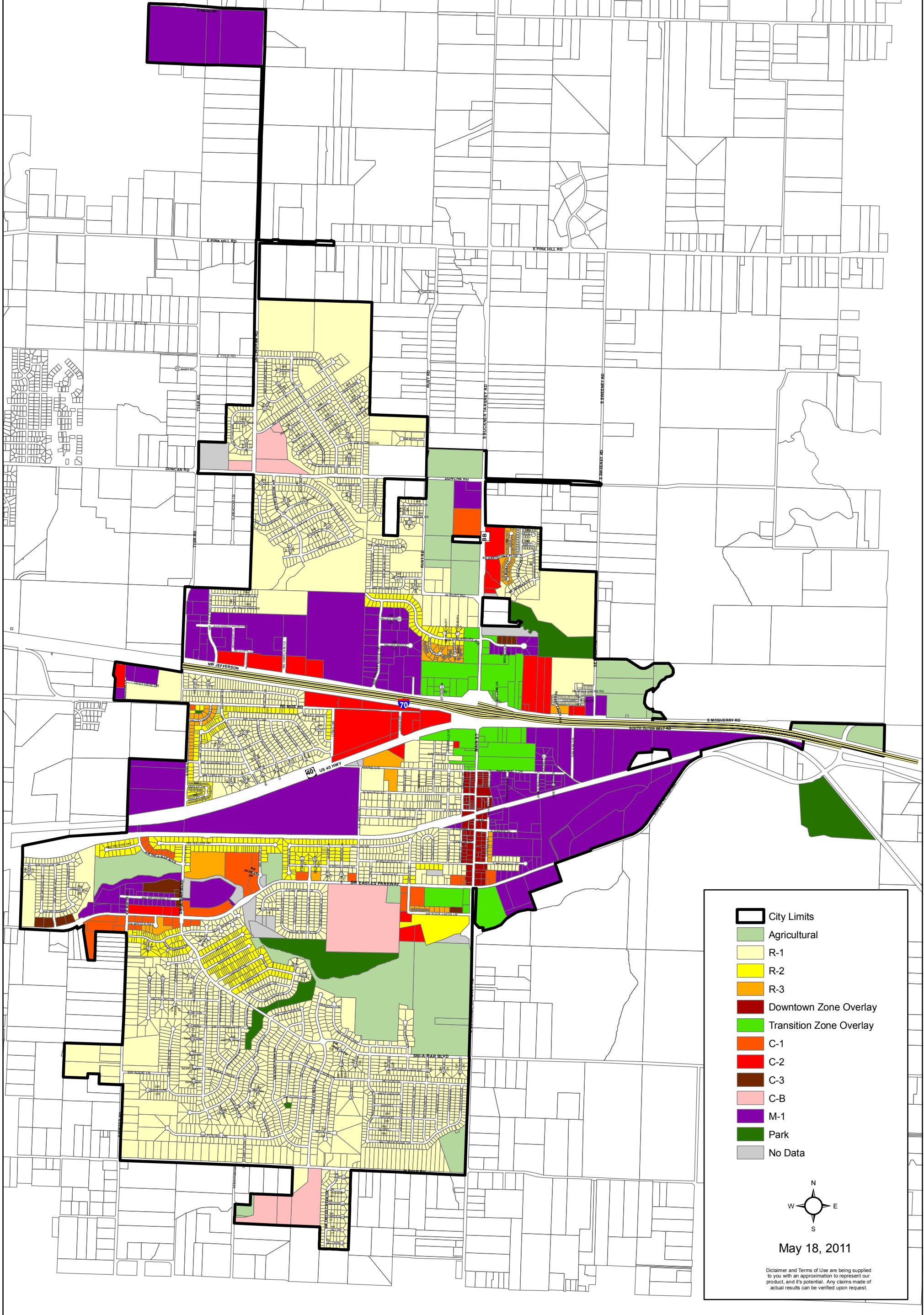














Figure 17: Preferred Land Use Plan



SECTION 1: The City of Grain Valley hereby enters into a marketing agreement with Utility Service Partners Private Label, Inc. d/b/a Service Line Warranties of America as outlined in the attached *Marketing Agreement*.

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MARKETING AGREEMENT

This MARKETING AGREEMENT ("Agreement") is entered into as of _____, 20__ ("**Effective Date**"), by and between the City of Grain Valley, Missouri ("**City**"), and Utility Service Partners Private Label, Inc. d/b/a Service Line Warranties of America ("**Company**"), herein collectively referred to singularly as "Party" and collectively as the "Parties".

RECITALS:

WHEREAS, sewer and water line laterals between the mainlines and the connection on residential private property are owned by individual residential property owners residing in the City ("**Residential Property Owner**"); and

WHEREAS, City desires to offer Residential Property Owners the opportunity, but not the obligation, to purchase a service line warranty and other similar products set forth in Exhibit A or as otherwise agreed in writing from time-to-time by the Parties (each, a "**Product**" and collectively, the "**Products**"); and

WHEREAS, Company, a subsidiary of HomeServe USA Corp., is the administrator of the National League of Cities Service Line Warranty Program and has agreed to make the Products available to Residential Property Owners subject to the terms and conditions contained herein; and

NOW, THEREFORE, in consideration of the foregoing recitals, and for other good and valuable consideration, the receipt and sufficiency of which is hereby acknowledged, and with the intent to be legally bound hereby, the Parties agree as follows:

1. **Purpose.** City hereby grants to Company the right to offer and market the Products to Residential Property Owners subject to the terms and conditions herein.
2. **Grant of License.** City hereby grants to Company a non-exclusive license ("**License**") to use City's name and logo on letterhead, bills and marketing materials to be sent to Residential Property Owners from time to time, and to be used in advertising (including on the Company's website), all at Company's sole cost and expense and subject to City's prior review and approval, which will not be unreasonably conditioned, delayed, or withheld. City agrees that it will not extend a similar license to any competitor of Company during the Term and any Renewal Term of this Agreement.
3. **Term.** The term of this Agreement ("**Term**") shall be for three (3) years from the Effective Date. The Agreement will automatically renew for additional one (1) year terms ("**Renewal Term**") unless one of the Parties gives the other written notice at least ninety (90) days prior to end of the Term or of a Renewal Term that the Party does not intend to renew this Agreement.

In the event that Company is in material breach of this Agreement, the City may terminate this Agreement thirty (30) days after giving written notice to Company of such breach, if said breach is not cured during said thirty (30) day period. Company will be permitted to complete any marketing initiative initiated or planned prior to termination of this Agreement after which time, neither Party will have any further obligations to the other and this Agreement will terminate.

4. **Consideration.**

A. As consideration for such license, Company will pay to City a License Fee as set forth in Exhibit A ("**License Fee**") during the term of this Agreement. The first payment shall be due by January 30th of the year following the conclusion of first year of the Term. Succeeding License Fee payments shall be made on an annual basis throughout the Term and any Renewal Term, due and payable on January 30th of the succeeding year. City will have the right, at its sole expense, to conduct an audit, upon reasonable notice and during normal business hours, of Company's books and records pertaining to any fees due under this Agreement while this Agreement is in effect and for one (1) year after any termination of this Agreement.

5. **Indemnification.** Company hereby agrees to protect, indemnify, and hold the City, its elected officials, officers, employees and agents (collectively or individually, "**Indemnitee**") harmless from and against any and all third party claims, damages, losses, expenses, suits, actions, decrees, judgments, awards, reasonable attorneys' fees and court costs (individually or collectively, "**Claim**"), which an Indemnitee may suffer or which may be sought against or are recovered or obtainable from an Indemnitee, as a result of or arising out of any breach of this Agreement by the Company, or any negligent or fraudulent act or omission of the Company or its officers, employees, contractors, subcontractors, or agents in the performance of services under the Products; provided that the applicable Indemnitee notifies Company of any such Claim within a time that does not prejudice the ability of Company to defend against such Claim. Any Indemnitee hereunder may participate in its, his, or her own defense, but will be responsible for all costs incurred, including reasonable attorneys' fees, in connection with such participation in such defense.

6. **Notice.** Any notice required to be given hereunder shall be deemed to have been given when notice is (i) received by the Party to whom it is directed by personal service, (ii) sent by electronic mail (provided confirmation of receipt is provided by the receiving Party), or (iii) deposited as registered or certified mail, return receipt requested, with the United States Postal Service, addressed as follows:

7. **Modifications or Amendments/Entire Agreement.** Any and all of the representations and obligations of the Parties are contained herein, and no modification, waiver or amendment of this Agreement or of any of its conditions or provisions shall be binding upon a party unless in writing signed by that Party.

8. **Assignment.** This Agreement and the License granted herein may not be assigned by Company other than to an affiliate or an acquirer of all or substantially all of its assets, without the prior written consent of the City, such consent not to be unreasonably withheld.

9. **Counterparts/Electronic Delivery; No Third Party Beneficiary.** This Agreement may be executed in counterparts, all such counterparts will constitute the same contract and the signature of any Party to any counterpart will be deemed a signature to, and may be appended to, any other counterpart. Executed copies hereof may be delivered by facsimile or e-mail and upon receipt will be deemed originals and binding upon the Parties hereto, regardless of whether originals are delivered thereafter. Nothing expressed or implied in this Agreement is intended, or should be construed, to confer upon or give any person or entity not a party to this agreement any third- party beneficiary rights, interests, or remedies under or by reason of any term, provision, condition, undertaking, warranty, representation, or agreement contained in this Agreement.

10. **Choice of Law/Attorney Fees.** The governing law shall be the laws of the State of Missouri. In the event that at any time during the Term or any Renewal Term either Party institutes any action or proceeding against the other relating to the provisions of this Agreement or any default hereunder, then the unsuccessful Party shall be responsible for the reasonable expenses of such action including reasonable attorney's fees, incurred therein by the successful Party.

11. **Incorporation of Recitals and Exhibits.** The above Recitals and Exhibit A attached hereto are incorporated by this reference and expressly made part of this Agreement.

I. Initial Term. Three years

II. License Fee. \$0.50 per Product for each month that a Product is in force for a Residential Property Owner (and for which payment is received by Company), aggregated and paid annually, for:

- a. City logo on letterhead, advertising, billing, and marketing materials
- b. Signature by City official

III. Products.

- a. External water service line warranty (initially, \$5.75 per month)
- b. External sewer/septic line warranty (initially, \$7.75 per month)
- c. Interior plumbing and drainage warranty (initially, \$9.99 per month)

Company may adjust the foregoing Product fees; provided, that any such adjustment shall not exceed \$.50 per month in any 12-month period, unless otherwise agreed by the Parties in writing.
