





- Preliminary Plat Rosewood Hills 8th, 9th, 10th Plat
 - Ken Murphy gave an overview of the preliminary plat submission. He stated that this project is located just north of the existing Rosewood Hills subdivision and is currently zoned R-1 single-family. Mr. Murphy told the Commission that there would be an 8ft trail built along the east side Dillingham Road as part of the trail master plan. Mr. Murphy stated that this development will consist of three phases covering just under 41 acres and will connect to Rosewood Drive. There are also

two ingress/egress points along Dillingham Road. There is right-of-way shown at the end of NW Lindenwood Drive and NW Crestwood Drive to allow for two ingress/egress points if and when the area to the east of the creek is developed. He also stated that Rosewood Drive will have sidewalk on both sides of the street because it's a collector and the rest will have sidewalk on one side.

- O Bob Dimmitt asked if there was detention on site. Rick Arroyo stated that there was detention being shown on Tract B and that everything would be finalized as engineering is approved. Mr. Dimmitt also asked about the area shown as Tract A. Bob Schmidt (L&B Development) who is the owner of the property stated that it was being left open because it has been identified as a wetland by DNR.
- O Elijah Greene asked if Tract C was for a pool. Mr. Murphy stated that it was just open space at this time.

AN ORDINANCE AMENDING SECTION 215 OF THE CODE OF ORDINANCES OF THE CITY OF GRAIN VALLEY, MISSOURI, PERTAINING TO THE UNLAWFUL POSSESSION AND USE OF WEAPONS AND ESTABLISHING AN EFFECTIVE DATE AND PENALTY PROVISION

WHEREAS, Chapter 215, Code of Ordinances, City of Grain Valley, Missouri ("City") relating to unlawful use of weapons has been amended from time to time to conform with Section 571.030 and following, RSMo, on the same subject; and

WHEREAS, by passage of Senate Bill 656, Section 571.030, RSMo has been updated to include new provisions, related to unlawful use of weapons and concealed carry permits; and

WHEREAS, the Board of Aldermen of the City has determined it to be in the best interest of the citizens of the City to amend Section 215 to reflect the recent changes to Section 571.030, RSMo., including Sections 571.030; 571.101; 571.104; 571.111; 571.205; 571.215; 571.220; 571.225; and 571.230.

NOW THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED by the Board of Aldermen of the City of Grain Valley, Missouri as follows:

SECTION 1: Chapter 215, Article X Offenses Against the Public Order, Section 215.410 of the City of Grain Valley, Missouri Municipal Code of Ordinance is amended to read as the following:

SECTION 215.410 Weapons – Carrying Concealed – Other Unlawful Use.

- A. A person commits the ordinance violation of unlawful use of weapons, except as otherwise provided by Sections 571.101 to 571.121, RSMO, if he or she knowingly:
 - (1) Carries concealed upon or about his or her person a knife, a firearm, a blackjack or any other weapon readily capable of lethal use into any area where firearms are restricted under Section 571.107, RSMo, or
 - (2) Sets a spring gun; or
 - (3) Discharges or shoots a firearm into a dwelling house, a railroad train, boat, aircraft, or motor vehicle as defined in Section 302.010, RSMo, or any building or structure used for the assembling of people; or
 - (4) Exhibits, in the presence of one (1) or more persons, any weapon readily capable of lethal use in an angry or threatening manner; or

- (5) Has a firearm or projectile weapon readily capable of lethal use on his or her person, while he or she is intoxicated and handles or otherwise uses such firearm or projectile weapon in either a negligent or unlawful manner or discharges such firearm or projectile weapon unless acting in self-defense; or
- (6) Discharges a firearm within one hundred (100) yards of any occupied schoolhouse, courthouse, or church building; or
- (7) Discharges or shoots a firearm at a mark, at any object, or at random, on, along or across a public highway or discharges or shoots a firearm into any outbuilding; or
- (8) Carries a firearm or other weapon readily capable of lethal use into any church or place where people have assembled for worship, or into any election precinct on any election day, or into any building owned or occupied by any agency of the federal government, state government, or political subdivision thereof, (including any meeting of the Board of Aldermen and any legislative or administrative committee of the City of Grain Valley); or
- (9) Discharges or shoots a firearm at or from a motor vehicle, as defined in Section 301.010, RSMo, while within the city, or discharges or shoots a firearm at any person, or at any other motor vehicle, or at any building or habitable structure, unless the person was lawfully acting in self-defense; or
- (10) Carries a firearm, whether loaded or unloaded, or any other weapon readily capable of lethal use into any school, onto any school bus, or onto the premises of any function or activity sponsored or sanctioned by school officials or the district school board; or
- (11) Possesses a firearm while also knowingly in possession of a controlled substance that is sufficient for a felony violation of Section 579.015, RSMo.
- B. No Missouri lifetime or extended concealed carry permit or any such permit issued by any other state, shall authorize any person to carry concealed firearms into:
 - (1) Any police, sheriff, or highway patrol office or station without the consent of the chief law enforcement officer in charge of that office or station. Possession of a firearm in a vehicle on the premises of the office or station shall not be a criminal offense so long as the firearm is not removed from the vehicle or brandished while the vehicle is on the premises;
 - (2) Within twenty-five feet of any polling place on any election day. Possession of a firearm in a vehicle on the premises of the polling place shall not be a criminal offense so long as the firearm is not removed from the vehicle or brandished while the vehicle is on the premises;

- (3) The facility of any adult or juvenile detention or correctional institution prison, or jail. Possession of a firearm in a vehicle on the premises of any adult, juvenile detention, or correctional institution, prison or jail shall not be a criminal offense so long as the firearm is not removed from the vehicle or brandished while the vehicle is on the premises;
- Any courthouse solely occupied by the circuit, appellate or supreme court, (4) or any courtrooms, administrative offices, libraries, or other rooms of any such court whether or not such court solely occupies the building in question. This subdivision shall also include, but not be limited, any juvenile, family, drug, or other court offices, any room or office wherein any of the courts or offices listed in this subdivision are temporarily conducting any business within the jurisdiction of such courts or offices, and such other locations in such manner as may be specified by supreme court rule under subdivision (6) of this subsection. Nothing in this subdivision shall preclude those persons listed in subdivision (1) of subsection 2 of section 5713.030 while within their jurisdiction and on duty, those persons listed in subdivisions (2), (4), and (10) of subsection 2 of section 571.030, or such other persons who serve in a law enforcement capacity for a court as may be specified by supreme court rule under subdivision (6) of this subsection from carrying a concealed firearm within any of the areas described in this subdivision. Possession of a firearm in a vehicle on the premises of any of the areas listed in this subdivision shall not be a criminal offense so long as the firearm is not removed from the vehicle or brandished while the vehicle is on the premises.
- (5) Any meeting of the governing body or committee thereof of a unit of local government, except that nothing in this subdivision shall preclude a member of the body holding a valid Missouri lifetime or extended concealed carry permit from carrying a concealed firearm at a meeting of the body which he or she is a member. Possession of a firearm in a vehicle on the premises shall not be a criminal offense so long as the firearm is not removed from the vehicle or brandished while the vehicle is on the premises.
- (6) Any portion of a building owned, leased, or controlled by the City of Grain Valley, Missouri. Any portion of a building in which the carrying of concealed firearms is prohibited or limited shall be clearly identified by signs posted at the entrance to the restricted area, as provided in Paragraph 13, below.
- (7) Any establishment licensed to dispense intoxicating liquor for consumption on the premises, which portion is primarily devoted to that purpose, without the consent of the owner or manager. The provisions of this subdivision shall not apply to the licensee of said establishment. The provisions of this subdivision shall not apply to any bona fide restaurant open to the general public having dining facilities for not less than fifty persons, and that receives at least fifty-one percent of its gross annual income from the dining facilities by the sale of food. This subdivision does not prohibit the possession of a firearm in a vehicle on the premises of the establishment and shall not be a criminal offense so long as the firearm is not removed from the vehicle or brandished while the vehicle is on the premises.

persons and property. Possession of a firearm in a vehicle on the premises of the airport shall not be a criminal offense so long as the firearm is not removed from the vehicle or brandished while the vehicle is on the premises:

Any area of an airport to which access is controlled by the inspection of

- (9) Any place where the carrying of a firearm is prohibited by federal law;
- (10) Any higher education institution or elementary or secondary school facility without the consent of the governing body of the higher education institution or school official or the district school board, unless the person with the Missouri lifetime or extended concealed carry permit is a teacher or administrator of an elementary or secondary school who has been designated by his or her school district as a school protection officer and is carrying a firearm in a school within that district, in which case no consent is required. Possession of a firearm in a vehicle on the premises of any higher education institution or elementary or secondary school facility shall not be a criminal offense so long as the firearm is not removed from the vehicle or brandished while the vehicle is on the premises;
- (11) Any portion of a building used as a child care facility without the consent of the manager. Nothing in this subdivision shall prevent the operator of a child care facility in a family home from owning or possessing a firearm or a Missouri lifetime or extended concealed carry permit;
- (12) Any church or other place of religious worship without the consent of the minister or person or persons representing the religious worship organization that exercises control over the place of religious worship. Possession of a firearm in a vehicle on the premises shall not be a criminal offense so long as the firearm is not removed from the vehicle or brandished while the vehicle is on the premises;
- Any private property whose owner has posted the premises as being off-(13)limits to concealed firearms by means of one or more signs displayed in a conspicuous place of a minimum size of eleven inches by fourteen inches with the writing thereon in letters of not less than one inch. The owner, business or commercial lessee, manager of a private business enterprise, or any other organization, entity, or person may prohibit persons holding a Missouri lifetime or extended concealed carry permit from carrying concealed firearms on the premises and may prohibit employees, not authorized by the employer, holding a Missouri lifetime or extended concealed carry permit from carrying concealed firearms on the property of the employer. If the building or the premises are open to the public, the employer of the business enterprise shall post signs on or about the premises if carrying a concealed firearm is prohibited. Possession of a firearm in a vehicle on the premises shall not be a criminal offense so long as the firearm is not removed from the vehicle or brandished while the vehicle is on the premises. An employer may prohibit employees or other persons holding a Missouri lifetime or extended concealed carry permit from carrying a concealed firearm in vehicles owned by the employer;

- (14) Any sports arena or stadium with a seating capacity of five thousand or
- more. Possession of a firearm in a vehicle on the premises shall not be a criminal offense so long as the firearm is not removed from the vehicle or brandished while the vehicle is on the premises.
- (15) Any hospital accessible by the public. Possession of a firearm in a vehicle on the premises of a hospital shall not be a criminal offense so long as the firearm is not removed from the vehicle or brandished while the vehicle is on the premises.
- C. This ordinance shall not apply to or affect any of the following persons, which such uses are reasonably associated with or are necessary to the fulfillment of such person's official duties, except as otherwise provided in this subsection:
 - (1) All state, county and municipal law enforcement officers who have completed the training required by the police officers standards and training commission pursuant to Sections 590.030 to 590.050, RSMo, and possessing the duty and power of arrest for violation of the general criminal laws of the state or for violation of ordinances of counties or municipalities of the state, whether such officers are on or off duty, and whether such officers are within or outside of the law enforcement agency's jurisdiction, or any person summoned by such officers to assist in making arrest or preserving the peace while actually engaged in assisting such officer;
 - (2) Wardens, superintendents and keepers of prisons, penitentiaries, jails and other institutions for the detention of persons accused or convicted of crime;
 - (3) Members of the armed forces or National Guard while performing their official duties;
 - (4) Those persons vested by Article V, Section 1, of the constitution of the state with the judicial power of the state and those persons vested by Article III of the Constitution of the United States with the judicial power of the United States, the members of the federal judiciary; or
 - (5) Any person whose bona fide duty is to execute process, civil or criminal;
 - (6) Any federal probation officer or federal flight deck officer as defined under the federal flight deck officer program, 49 U.S.C. Section 44921, regardless of whether such officers are on duty, or within the law enforcement agency's jurisdiction;
 - (7) Any state probation or parole officer, including supervisors and members of the board of probation and parole;

- (8) Any corporate security advisory meeting the definition and fulfilling the requirements of the regulations established by the department of public safety under Section 590.750, RSMo;
- (9) Any coroner, deputy coroner, medical examiner, or assistant medical examiner.
- (10) Any municipal or county prosecuting attorney or assistant prosecuting attorney; municipal, associate, or circuit judge; or any person appointed by a court to be a special prosecutor who has completed the firearms safety training course required under subsection 2 of Section 571.111, RSMo.
- (11) Any member of the fire department who is employed on a full-time basis as a fire investigator and who has a valid concealed carry endorsement issued prior to Section 571.111, RSMo, when such uses are reasonably associated with or are necessary to the fulfillment of such person's official duties.
- (12) Nothing in this section shall make it unlawful for a student to actually participate in school-sanctioned gun safety courses, student military or ROTC courses, or other school-sponsored firearm-related events, provided the student does not carry a firearm or other weapon readily capable of lethal use into any school, onto any school bus, or onto the premises of any function or activity sponsored or sanctioned by school officials or the district school board.

D. Penalty

(1) Any person found guilty of violating any provisions of this ordinance shall not be guilty of a crime, but the violator shall be subject to immediate removal from the premises, business or building.

If the person refuses to leave upon request of the owner, manager or authorized person, and the police department is summoned to assist in the removal, the person found to have refused to leave the premises may be cited by general ordinance summons for such failure to leave and may be required to appear in the Grain Valley Municipal Court. Upon conviction, the violating person may be fined a maximum of \$100 for the first violation; \$200 for any subsequent violation within six (6) months of the first violation; and maximum of \$500 for any third or subsequent violation.

(2) In addition, said violating person may be charged with other applicable ordinance violations, including trespass, disorderly conduct, and other specific code violations. The Court may impose penalties for such violations as set forth in the City's General Penalty Provision, Section 100.110 herein.

SECTION 2: This ordinance shall become effective on March 27, 2017.

Ordinance to Amend Section 215.410

On January 1, 2017 Missouri Senate Bill 656 took effect, which enacted fourteen (14) new revisions and provisions related to existing Missouri Statutes which covered Criminal Firearms Offenses. The statute revised several previous criminal offenses, generally including carrying of concealed firearms by citizens without a permit, with some restrictions.

The existing Grain Valley Ordinance (Section 215), which included prohibitions for the illegal carrying of concealed firearms without a permit (other than sworn law enforcement), was no longer valid because it did not conform to existing state law. I and City Attorney Jim Cook worked to develop the proposed ordinance now being presented for consideration by the Board of Aldermen. Mr. Cook has revised the city ordinance to conform to the new Missouri Statute. The proposed ordinance resolution has been placed on the Agenda for the Board of Aldermen meeting of February 13, 2017.

Article X. Offenses Against the Public Order

Section 215.410. Weapons — Carrying Concealed — Other Unlawful Use.

- A. A person commits the offense of unlawful use of weapons if he/she knowingly:
 - 1. Carries concealed upon or about his/her person a knife, a firearm, a blackjack or any other weapon readily capable of lethal use.

 - 3. Exhibits, in the presence of one (1) or more persons, any weapon readily capable of lethal use in an angry or threatening manner or has a firearm or projectile weapon capable of lethal use on his or her person, while he or she is intoxicated, and handles or otherwise uses such firearm or projectile weapon in either a negligent or unlawful manner or discharges such firearm or projectile weapon unless acting in self-defense.  - 4. Carries a firearm or any other weapon readily capable of lethal use into any church or place where people have assembled for worship, or into any school, or into any election precinct on any election day, or into any building owned or occupied by any agency of the Federal Government, State Government or of the City, or into any public assemblage of persons met for any lawful purpose, except as provided below.
- B. Subparagraphs (1), (2) and (4) of Subsection **(A)** of this Section shall not apply to or affect any of the following:

All State, County and Municipal Law Enforcement Officers possessing the duty and power of arrest for violation of the general criminal laws of the State or for violation of ordinances of counties or municipalities of the State, or any person summoned by such officers to assist in making arrests or preserving the peace while actually engaged in assisting such officer;

- 2. Wardens, superintendents and keepers of prisons, penitentiaries, jails and other institutions for the detention of persons accused or convicted of crime;
- 3. Members of the Armed Forces or National Guard while performing their official duty;
- 4. Those persons vested by Article **V**, Section 1 of the Constitution of Missouri with the judicial power of the State and those persons vested by Article III of the Constitution of the United States with the judicial power of the United States, the members of the Federal Judiciary;
- 5. Any person whose bona fide duty is to execute process, civil or criminal;
- 6. Any Federal probation officer; and
- 7. Any corporate security advisor meeting the definition and fulfilling the requirements of the regulations established by the Board of Police Commissioners under Section 84.340, RSMo.
- C. Subparagraphs (1, 3 and 4) of Subsection (A) of this Section do not apply when the actor is transporting such weapons in a nonfunctioning state or in an unloaded state when ammunition is not readily accessible or when such weapons are not readily accessible. Subparagraph (1) of Subsection (A) of this Section does not apply when the actor is also in possession of an exposed firearm or projectile weapon for the lawful pursuit of game, or is in his/her dwelling unit or upon business premises over which the actor has possession, authority or control, or is traveling in a continuous journey peaceably through the City.

- 4. Exhibits, in the presence of one (1) or more persons, any weapon readily capable of lethal use in an angry or threatening manner; or
- 5. Has a firearm or projectile weapon readily capable of lethal use on his or her person, while he or she is intoxicated and handles or otherwise uses such firearm or projectile weapon in either a negligent or unlawful manner or discharges such firearm or projectile weapon unless acting in self-defense; or
- 6. Discharges a firearm within one hundred (100) yards of any occupied schoolhouse, courthouse, or church building; or
- 7. Discharges or shoots a firearm at a mark, at any object, or at random, on, along or across a public highway or discharges or shoots a firearm into any outbuilding; or
- 8. Carries a firearm or other weapon readily capable of lethal use into any church or place where people have assembled for worship, or into any election precinct on any election day, or into any building owned or occupied by any agency of the federal government, state government, or political subdivision thereof, (including any meeting of the Board of Alderman and any legislative or administrative committee of the City of Grain Valley); or
- 9. Discharges or shoots a firearm at or from a motor vehicle, as defined in Section 301.010, RSMo, while within the city, or discharges or shoots a firearm at any person, or at any other motor vehicle, or at any building or habitable structure, unless the person was lawfully acting in self-defense; or
- 10. Carries a firearm, whether loaded or unloaded, or any other weapon readily capable of lethal use into any school, onto any school bus, or onto the premises of any function or activity sponsored or sanctioned by school officials or the district school board; or
- 11. Possesses a firearm while also knowingly in possession of a controlled substance that is sufficient for a felony violation of Section 579.015, RSMo.
- B. No Missouri lifetime or extended concealed carry permit or any such permit issued by any other state, shall authorize any person to carry concealed firearms into:
- 1. Any police, sheriff, or highway patrol office or station without the consent of the chief law enforcement officer in charge of that office or station. Possession of a firearm in a vehicle on the premises of the office or station shall not be a criminal offense so long as the firearm is not removed from the vehicle or brandished while the vehicle is on the premises;
- 2. Within twenty-five feet of any polling place on any election day. Possession of a firearm in a vehicle on the premises of the polling place shall not be a criminal offense so long as the firearm is not removed from the vehicle or brandished while the vehicle is on the premises;
- 3. The facility of any adult or juvenile detention or correctional institution prison, or jail. Possession of

a firearm in a vehicle on the premises of any adult, juvenile detention, or correctional institution, prison or jail shall not be a criminal offense so long as the firearm is not removed from the vehicle or brandished while the vehicle is on the premises;

- 4. Any courthouse solely occupied by the circuit, appellate or supreme court, or any courtrooms, administrative offices, libraries, or other rooms of any such court whether or not such court solely occupies the building in question. This subdivision shall also include, but not be limited, any juvenile, family, drug, or other court offices, any room or office wherein any of the courts or offices listed in this subdivision are temporarily conducting any business within the jurisdiction of such courts or offices, and such other locations in such manner as may be specified by supreme court rule under subdivision (6) of this subsection. Nothing in this subdivision shall preclude those persons listed in subdivision (1) of subsection 2 of section 5713.030 while within their jurisdiction and on duty, those persons listed in subdivisions (2), (4), and (10) of subsection 2 of section 571.030, or such other persons who serve in a law enforcement capacity for a court as may be specified by supreme court rule under subdivision (6) of this subsection from carrying a concealed firearm within any of the areas described in this subdivision. Possession of a firearm in a vehicle on the premises of any of the areas listed in this subdivision shall not be a criminal offense so long as the firearm is not removed from the vehicle or brandished while the vehicle is on the premises.
- 5. Any meeting of the governing body or committee thereof of a unit of local government, except that nothing in this subdivision shall preclude a member of the body holding a valid Missouri lifetime or extended concealed carry permit from carrying a concealed firearm at a meeting of the body which he or she is a member. Possession of a firearm in a vehicle on the premises shall not be a criminal offense so long as the firearm is not removed from the vehicle or brandished while the vehicle is on the premises.
- 6. Any portion of a building owned, leased, or controlled by the City of Grain Valley, Missouri. Any portion of a building in which the carrying of concealed firearms is prohibited or limited shall be clearly identified by signs posted at the entrance to the restricted area, as provided in Paragraph 13, below.
- 7. Any establishment licensed to dispense intoxicating liquor for consumption on the premises, which portion is primarily devoted to that purpose, without the consent of the owner or manager. The provisions of this subdivision shall not apply to the licensee of said establishment. The provisions of this subdivision shall not apply to any bona fide restaurant open to the general public having dining facilities for not less than fifty persons, and that receives at least fifty-one percent of its gross annual income from the dining facilities by the sale of food. This subdivision does not prohibit the possession of a firearm in a vehicle on the premises of the establishment and shall not be a criminal offense so long as the firearm is not removed from the vehicle or brandished while the vehicle is on the premises.
- 8. Any area of an airport to which access is controlled by the inspection of persons and property. Possession of a firearm in a vehicle on the premises of the airport shall not be a criminal offense so long as the firearm is not removed from the vehicle or brandished while the vehicle is on the premises;
- 9. Any place where the carrying of a firearm is prohibited by federal law;
- 10. Any higher education institution or elementary or secondary school facility without the consent of the governing body of the higher education institution or school official or the district school board, unless the person with the Missouri lifetime or extended concealed carry permit is a teacher or administrator of an elementary or secondary school who has been designated by his or her school district as a school protection officer and is carrying a firearm in a school within that district, in which case no consent is required. Possession of a firearm in a vehicle on the premises of any higher education institution or elementary or secondary school facility shall not be a criminal offense so long as the firearm is not removed from the vehicle or brandished while the vehicle is on the

premises;

- 11. Any portion of a building used as a child care facility without the consent of the manager. Nothing in this subdivision shall prevent the operator of a child care facility in a family home from owning or possessing a firearm or a Missouri lifetime or extended concealed carry permit;
- 12. Any church or other place of religious worship without the consent of the minister or person or persons representing the religious worship organization that exercises control over the place of religious worship. Possession of a firearm in a vehicle on the premises shall not be a criminal offense so long as the firearm is not removed from the vehicle or brandished while the vehicle is on the premises;
- 13. Any private property whose owner has posted the premises as being off-limits to concealed firearms by means of one or more signs displayed in a conspicuous place of a minimum size of eleven inches by fourteen inches with the writing thereon in letters of not less than one inch. The owner, business or commercial lessee, manager of a private business enterprise, or any other organization, entity, or person may prohibit persons holding a Missouri lifetime or extended concealed carry permit from carrying concealed firearms on the premises and may prohibit employees, not authorized by the employer, holding a Missouri lifetime or extended concealed carry permit from carrying concealed firearms on the property of the employer. If the building or the premises are open to the public, the employer of the business enterprise shall post signs on or about the premises if carrying a concealed firearm is prohibited. Possession of a firearm in a vehicle on the premises shall not be a criminal offense so long as the firearm is not removed from the vehicle or brandished while the vehicle is on the premises. An employer may prohibit employees or other persons holding a Missouri lifetime or extended concealed carry permit from carrying a concealed firearm in vehicles owned by the employer;
- 14. Any sports arena or stadium with a seating capacity of five thousand or more. Possession of a firearm in a vehicle on the premises shall not be a criminal offense so long as the firearm is not removed from the vehicle or brandished while the vehicle is on the premises.
- 15. Any hospital accessible by the public. Possession of a firearm in a vehicle on the premises of a hospital shall not be a criminal offense so long as the firearm is not removed from the vehicle or brandished while the vehicle is on the premises.
- C. This ordinance shall not apply to or affect any of the following persons, which such uses are reasonably associated with or are necessary to the fulfillment of such person's official duties, except as otherwise provided in this subsection:
- 1. All state, county and municipal law enforcement officers who have completed the training required by the police officers standards and training commission pursuant to Sections 590.030 to 590.050, RSMo, and possessing the duty and power of arrest for violation of the general criminal laws of the state or for violation of ordinances of counties or municipalities of the state, whether such officers are on or off duty, and whether such officers are within or outside of the law enforcement agency's jurisdiction, or any person summoned by such officers to assist in making arrest or preserving the peace while actually engaged in assisting such officer;
- 2. Wardens, superintendents and keepers of prisons, penitentiaries, jails and other institutions for the detention of persons accused or convicted of crime;
- 3. Members of the armed forces or National Guard while performing their official duties;
- 4. Those persons vested by Article V, Section 1, of the constitution of the state with the judicial power of the state and those persons vested by Article III of the Constitution of the United States with the judicial power of the United States, the members of the federal judiciary; or

- 5. Any person whose bona fide duty is to execute process, civil or criminal;
- 6. Any federal probation officer or federal flight deck officer as defined under the federal flight deck officer program, 49 U.S.C. Section 44921, regardless of whether such officers are on duty, or within the law enforcement agency's jurisdiction;
- 7. Any state probation or parole officer, including supervisors and members of the board of probation and parole;
- 8. Any corporate security advisory meeting the definition and fulfilling the requirements of the regulations established by the department of public safety under Section 590.750, RSMo;
- 9. Any coroner, deputy coroner, medical examiner, or assistant medical examiner.
- 10. Any municipal or county prosecuting attorney or assistant prosecuting attorney; municipal, associate, or circuit judge; or any person appointed by a court to be a special prosecutor who has completed the firearms safety training course required under subsection 2 of Section 571.111, RSMo.
- 11. Any member of the fire department who is employed on a full-time basis as a fire investigator and who has a valid concealed carry endorsement issued prior to Section 571.111, RSMo, when such uses are reasonably associated with or are necessary to the fulfillment of such person's official duties.
- 12. Nothing in this section shall make it unlawful for a student to actually participate in school-sanctioned gun safety courses, student military or ROTC courses, or other school-sponsored firearm-related events, provided the student does not carry a firearm or other weapon readily capable of lethal use into any school, onto any school bus, or onto the premises of any function or activity sponsored or sanctioned by school officials or the district school board.

D. Penalty

- 1. Any person found guilty of violating any provisions of this ordinance shall not be guilty of a crime, but the violator shall be subject to immediate removal from the premises, business or building.
 - If the person refuses to leave upon request of the owner, manager or authorized person, and the police department is summoned to assist in the removal, the person found to have refused to leave the premises may be cited by general ordinance summons for such failure to leave and may be required to appear in the Grain Valley Municipal Court. Upon conviction, the violating person may be fined a maximum of \$100 for the first violation; \$200 for any subsequent violation within six (6) months of the first violation; and maximum of \$500 for any third or subsequent violation.
- 2. In addition, said violating person may be charged with other applicable ordinance violations, including trespass, disorderly conduct, and other specific code violations. The Court may impose penalties for such violations as set forth in the City's General Penalty Provision, Section 100.110 herein.
- E. Effective Date. This Ordinance shall become effective on February 27, 2017.

FUNDING AGREEMENT

This **FUNDING AGREEMENT** ("Agreement") is entered into this ___ day of _____, 2017, between the **CITY OF GRAIN VALLEY, MISSOURI** a Missouri municipal corporation (the "City"), and **SMAS INVESTORS, LLC**, a Missouri limited liability company, or its assigns (the "Developer").

RECITALS

WHEREAS, the Developer wishes to develop certain property located generally at the northwest corner of the Interstate 70 and Missouri BB Highway interchange into a retail shopping center; and

WHEREAS, the Developer desires to prepare for the City's consideration an application to request incentives, including but not limited to a community improvement district ("Development Incentives Application"); and

WHEREAS, the City may be requested to provide such other services and assistance as may be required to implement and administer the Development Incentives Application through its consideration by the Board of Aldermen; and

WHEREAS, the City does not have a source of funds to finance costs incurred by it, in the form of additional legal, financial, planning, transportation and engineering, and other consultants, or for direct out-of-pocket expenses and other costs resulting from services rendered to the Developer to review, evaluate, process and consider the Development Incentives Application; and

WHEREAS, in order for the City to fully consider and evaluate the Development Incentives Application, the City has requested Developer to deposit funds with the City to be used by the City to pay for the City's actual out-of-pocket expenses necessary to perform a full evaluation of the Development Incentives Application and engage consultants as needed for such evaluation.

NOW THEREFORE, in consideration of the foregoing and other good and valuable consideration, the receipt and sufficiency of which are hereby acknowledged, the parties hereby agree as follows:

1. **Services to be Performed by the City.** The City shall:

- A. Consult with the Developer on the preparation and consideration of the Development Incentives Application, give all notices, make all publications and hold hearings as required by all applicable laws;
- B. Provide necessary staff, legal, financial, appraisal, and planning assistance to prepare and present the Development Incentives Application to the Board of Aldermen and to prepare and present required ordinances to the Board of Aldermen;
- C. In the event that the Board of Aldermen approves all or any portion of the Development Incentives Application, provide the necessary staff and legal, financial, appraisal, and planning assistance to prepare and negotiate a definitive agreement between the Developer

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and the City for implementation of the Development Incentives Application or appropriate portion thereof;

- D. In the event that a definitive agreement between the Developer and the City for implementation of the Development Incentives Application or an appropriate portion thereof is entered into, provide the necessary staff, legal, financial, appraisal, and planning assistance to administer such agreement(s) and implement the Development Incentives Application.
- 2. <u>Initial Deposit</u>. On or before March 28, 2017, the Developer shall deposit Ten Thousand Dollars (\$10,000.00) (the "Deposit") with the City's Finance Director. The City shall disburse the Deposit as set forth in **Section 5** and shall bill the Developer pursuant to **Section 3** to re-establish the Deposit so that there is always a minimum cash balance of Ten Thousand Dollars (\$10,000.00) available, from which additional disbursements may be made as required.

3. **Additional Funding.**

- A. The City shall submit an itemized statement to Developer for actual out-of-pocket expenses necessary to perform its obligations hereunder or for any additional obligations or expenditures incurred by the City. Such statements shall be submitted on a regular periodic basis, but no more often than monthly. The Developer shall pay the City the amounts set forth on such statements (the "Additional Funds") within thirty (30) days of receipt thereof. If such funds are not so received, the unpaid balance may be subject to a penalty of two percent (2%) per month until paid, but in no event shall such penalty exceed twenty-four percent (24%) per annum, and City shall be relieved of any and all obligations hereunder until paid or may terminate this Agreement pursuant to **Section 7**. Notwithstanding the foregoing, the Developer shall ensure that on the dates upon which the Board of Aldermen takes up the Development Incentives Application for consideration, the Deposit shall be replenished to the amount of the minimum cash balance established in **Section 2**. Failure to replenish the Deposit as described shall be grounds for discontinuing the consideration before the Board of Aldermen.
- B. The City and the Developer agree that the Developer shall reimburse the City for its actual out-of-pocket expenses necessary to perform the City's obligations hereunder, using the following consultants: Lauber Municipal Law, LLC, for special legal counsel.

The City shall advise the Developer in writing if it intends to utilize the services of any other consultant to perform its obligations under the terms of this Agreement. Such written notice shall include the name of the consultant, the service to be performed and an estimate of the cost expected. If the Developer, in writing, within five (5) business days from receipt of the City's notice, objects to either the consultant named or the service to be performed, the City and Developer shall negotiate in good faith to resolve the Developer's objections. If the City and Developer cannot agree on the consultant to be used or the service to be performed, the City shall have no obligation to perform that service under the terms of this Agreement and the Developer shall have no obligation to pay for such service under the terms of this Agreement.

C. The Deposit and all Additional Funds shall be treated as funds that may be reimbursed from sales tax collected as permitted by law; provided, that the Development Incentives Application or appropriate portion thereof is approved and the Developer and the City enter into a definitive agreement for implementation of the Development Incentives Application or appropriate portion thereof.

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- 4. **Effective Date**. The effective date of this Funding Agreement shall be March 1, 2017
- 5. <u>Disbursement of Funds.</u> The City shall disburse the Deposit and Additional Funds for reimbursement of costs to the City on or before the thirtieth (30th) day of each month, and for consulting fees and the payment of all out-of-pocket expenses incurred by the City in connection with the performance of its obligations under this Agreement as payment for such expenses become due. The City shall send to the Developer a copy of the record for each disbursement made to the Developer pursuant to this Agreement.
- 6. <u>Development Incentives Application Administration</u>. In addition to the services set forth in **Section 1**, the City may be required to provide services from time to time for the continuing administration of the Development Incentives Application, if approved by the City. Upon appropriate itemization, the City shall be reimbursed by the Developer for actual meeting expenses and other expenses that are reasonable or incidental to the general operations of the City with respect to administration of the Development Incentives Application and any development that results from the Development Incentives Application. The provisions of this section shall apply until such time as the City and the Developer agree to and execute a definitive agreement for implementation of the Development Incentives Application.

7. <u>Termination of this Agreement.</u>

- A. In the event the Developer fails to perform any of its obligations herein, the City may terminate this Agreement, and any other agreement between the parties, at its sole discretion if the Developer fails to cure the default within ten (10) days after written notice to the Developer of the default. Termination by the City shall also terminate any duties and obligations of the City with respect to this Agreement, including, but not limited to, the City's processing of Developer's Development Incentives Application. Upon such termination, the City shall retain the Deposit and Additional Funds, if any, necessary to reimburse the City for all expenses incurred under this Agreement to the date of termination and any monies due and owing to the City pursuant to any other agreement.
- B. The parties hereto acknowledge that the Developer may determine to abandon the Development Incentives Application or appropriate portion thereof. Upon written notice of abandonment by the Developer, this Agreement shall terminate and the City may terminate any other agreement between the parties and shall retain the Deposit and Additional Funds, if any, necessary to reimburse the City for all expenses incurred under this Agreement to the date of termination and any monies due and owing to the City pursuant to any other agreement.
- C. Upon termination of this Agreement, in the event the Deposit and Additional Funds are insufficient to reimburse the City for the outstanding expenses of the City payable hereunder, the Developer shall reimburse the City as set forth in **Section 3**. After termination of this Agreement, any amounts remaining from the Deposit and the Additional Funds after all amounts have either been paid as directed by, or reimbursed to, the City shall be returned to the Developer.
- D. This Agreement may be terminated by mutual agreement of the City and the Developer through provisions in a definitive agreement for implementation of the Development

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Incentives Application to be executed concurrently or immediately after the Development Incentives Application are approved, e.g., a Cooperative Agreement.

8. <u>Notice</u>. Any notice, approval, request or consent required by or asked to be given under this Agreement shall be deemed to be given if in writing and mailed by United States mail, postage prepaid, or delivered by hand, and addressed as follows:

- 9. <u>City Requirements and Prior Approval.</u> The Developer agrees to comply with all applicable laws and City ordinances, including, but not limited to, the City's zoning ordinances, subdivision regulations and all planning or infrastructure requirements related to the development of Developer's property. The parties agree that execution of this Agreement in no way constitutes a waiver of any requirements of applicable City ordinances or policies with which the Developer must comply and does not in any way constitute prior approval of any future proposal for development, including the Development Incentives Application. The parties understand that the City may not lawfully contract away its police powers and that approval of the Development Incentives Application and any zoning, subdivision and similar development Application cannot be contractually guaranteed. This Agreement does not alter or diminish the City's ability to exercise its legislative discretion to consider the Development Incentives Application in accordance with all applicable laws and any other Application with respect to development of Developer's property.
- 10. <u>Modification</u>. The terms, conditions, and provisions of this Agreement can be neither modified nor eliminated except in writing and by mutual agreement between the City and the Developer.
- 11. **Applicable Law.** This Agreement shall be governed by and construed in accordance with the laws of the State of Missouri.

- 12. **No Third Party Beneficiaries.** This Agreement is made and entered into for the sole protection and benefit of the City and Developer. No other person or entity shall have or acquire any right or action based upon any provisions of this Agreement.
- 13. **Entire Agreement.** This Agreement constitutes the entire agreement and understanding between the parties with respect to the subject matter hereof, and supersedes and replaces any and all prior oral agreements or written agreements, arrangements, and understandings related thereto.
- 14. **Counterparts.** This Agreement may be executed in any number of counterparts, each of which shall be an original, but all of which together shall constitute one instrument.

PROBLEM IDENTIFICATION

Alcohol and other drugs contribute substantially to traffic crashes on Missouri's roads, particularly those resulting in death or serious injury. In the 2012-2014 period, 414,173 traffic crashes occurred in the state. Of those, 0.5% resulted in a fatality and 2.9% involved someone being seriously injured. During the same time period, there were 19,161 traffic crashes where one or more drivers, pedestrians, and/or bicyclists were under the influence of intoxicants and in the opinion of the investigating officer their intoxicated condition was a contributing factor to the crash. In these crashes where drivers, pedestrians or bicyclists were impaired by alcohol or other drugs, 689 people were killed and another 2,447 were seriously injured. It also is important to note that substance-impaired driving is under-reported as a contributing factor in traffic crashes. This under-reporting is due to drivers undergoing injuries sustained from crashes without being tested for blood alcohol content. Also, some forms of drug impairment may not be apparent to officers on the scene. As a result, it is an even greater problem than these statistics would indicate. In addition, 86.1% of substance-impaired drivers killed also failed to wear a safety belt further compounding the problem of substance-impaired driving.

A common misconception is that substance-impaired drivers are primarily injuring and killing themselves. While that is often true, a substantial number of people killed and seriously injured in these crashes were not intoxicated by alcohol or other drugs. Their actions in these incidents probably did not contribute to the cause of the collision. Of the 689 people killed in alcohol and other drug-related traffic crashes, 71.4% were the substance-impaired drivers/pedestrians/bicyclists and 28.6% were some other involved party. Of the 2,447 seriously injured, 61.8% were the substance-impaired drivers/pedestrians/bicyclists while 38.2% were other persons in the incidents.

Grain Valley is located in eastern Jackson County, Missouri along Interstate 70 and also accessible via US 40 Highway, State Route AA and State Route BB Highways. Recent estimates (2014) show that Grain Valley has a population of 13,236 and is roughly 6 square miles in size. Considered a residential community, there has been an increase in businesses locating to Grain Valley and currently there are 2 bars in town which are open until 3:00 am - one of which boasts to be the largest bar in the area.

According to Missouri State Highway Patrol statistics, there were 362 traffic crashes in Grain Valley during 2013, 2014, and 2015. Of those accidents, 25 crashes were alcohol related - 5 crashes resulted in disabling injuries, 8 ending in minor injuries. During this same time period - 414 DWI arrest have been made through grant funded enforcement and routine patrol.

High crash days and times are Saturday followed by Sunday and Friday with accident times ranging between midnight and 4:00 am.

PROBLEM IDENTIFICATION

Hazardous Moving Violations (HMV) also known as aggressive driving is a serious problem on Missouri's roadways and has contributed substantially to traffic crashes, especially crashes resulting in death. Aggressive drivers are defined within Missouri's Blueprint to SAVE MORE LIVES as, "drivers of motorized vehicles who committed one or more of the following violations which contributed to the cause of a traffic crash: speeding; driving too fast for conditions; and/or following too close."

Aggressive drivers not only put their own lives at risk, but the lives of others as well. Of the 930 people killed, 67.4% were the aggressive driver and the other 32.6% were some other party in the incident. Of the 5,266 seriously injured, slightly more than one-half (53.9%) were the aggressive drivers and nearly one-half (46.1%) being some other person involved.

Grain Valley is located in eastern Jackson County, Missouri along Interstate 70 and also accessible via US 40 Highway, State Route AA and State Route BB Highways. Recent estimates (2014) show that Grain Valley has a population of 13,236 and is roughly 6 square miles in size.

According to Missouri State Highway Patrol statistics, there were 362 traffic crashes in Grain Valley during 2013, 2014, and 2015. Of those accidents, 73 reported minor injuries and 8 reported disabling injuries. High crash days and times are Monday, Wednesday, Friday, and Saturday (weekends being the highest) with accident times ranging from 7:00 am and 9:00 am and then from 2:00 pm until 7:00 pm.

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ITEM I: ADMINISTRATION

The following pages contain the detailed report of City operations throughout the month of February.

February proved to be a steady month for Administration. We spent a significant amount of time handling human resources, as we recruited and coordinated interviews for multiple positions. The new City Clerk started on February 27th and is doing well in her training program. February was also a good month for public engagement. Staff continued to promote the City's Facebook page as much as possible and as a result we saw a 15% increase in page likes. This increase brought our total likes up to 2,969. Additionally, the total reach of our posts were 7,525 through the months end. Some of the top posts for February were related to the Burn Ban and the Mayor's Proclamation for Paul Morgenroth's 90th Birthday.

February was also a productive month for Community Development. During the month, we issued 7 single family dwelling (SFD) building permits, 3 commercial permit and 24 miscellaneous permits. In addition to processing all of the new building permit applications, the inspection division performed 434 inspections. Codes Enforcement made 159 stops and conducted 86 code violation inspections. The planning & engineering division continued to work with a developer on the additional phase of single family homes in Rosewood. Additional activities can be found in the following report, but some of the noteworthy items include completion of the new pumps at the Tyer Road pump station and the announcement of Household Hazardous Waste collection event on October 7th. The Public Works division of Community Development continued its ongoing maintenance work, worked on the valve and hydrant exercising program and inspected/televised 17,466 ft. of sewer lines.

In February, Finance completed all 2016 year end work. Additionally, the trial balances and general ledger were sent to our auditing firm for review. The auditors will be on site for workdays March 27th-April 7th.

Parks and Recreation remained busy as they prepare for spring and summer. In February, they hosted the annual Father/Daughter Dance, which had 180 attendees.



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They also opened registration for youth baseball and softball, which had over 300 participants registered by the end of the month.

In February, Police Department activity continued to decrease, both year to date and from the number in February of 2016. The department handled 310 calls for service in February compared to 340 in the same month last year. Again we see categories of service that experience a downturn as we are continuing to struggle with staffing needs. As previously mentioned, the trend is not just a local problem, but seems to be impacting most law enforcement agencies in the region. We continue to aggressively recruit officers. With the shortage in staffing, we continue to see self-initiated activities drop. This is not because of a lack of effort, but rather a lack of discretionary time to perform proactive police work. I am most troubled to see an increase in crimes accompany the decrease in self-initiated activity. This is best illustrated by comparing last year's numbers in contrast with this year's numbers. We will continue to work on recruiting efforts and programs that will assist in making the City of Grain Valley a more competitive employer in the market of local governments

Thank you for allowing me to serve the City of Grain Valley. This is an exciting time in our community's history as we continue to see new growth throughout the City. The growth offers unique opportunities and challenges, all of which our staff continue to face head on. The day to day engagement with our business owners and residents make us successful. This is only possible because of the dedicated employees working on a daily basis to make Grain Valley a desirable place to live, visit and conduct business.
